Why is Hope House needed?

Within 100 miles of where Hope House will be built, there are nearly 600 deaths of children aged 0-24 each year. Over 200 of these deaths are infants. These devastating losses impact nearly 1,800 siblings, close to 1,200 parents, and almost 2,400 grandparents.

Who can stay at Hope House?

Family members who have experienced the loss of a child are all welcome at Hope House.

Who will run Hope House?

Volunteers and those who have lived the experience will all donate their time and talents to make Hope House's annual operations possible.

How long will families be able to stay?

A typical stay will be 3 to 4 days, depending on family needs.

How many people can stay at Hope House?

Hope House will sleep up to 10 family members.

How does a family arrange to stay at Hope House?

Families can arrange a stay on a referral by their priest or pastor, their physician, their counselor, or their funeral director.

What is the cost to stay at Hope House?

There is no charge for grieving families and their relatives to stay at Hope House.

What amenities will Hope House offer visitors?

A stay at Hope House will offer families the chance to “get away” - an opportunity to breathe in the calm that a serene country setting can provide.

After the loss of a child, everything is turned upside down. Hope House will provide time to gather as family, to laugh, cry, rest, and reflect on life. Guests can relax in a comfortable 1,600 square foot log cabin surrounded by beautiful woods. During their free stay, guests can hike the woods, play games, or just sit on the covered front porch and enjoy the peace and quiet.

It is our hope that at Hope House families will find comfort in knowing the space they are enjoying has also brought comfort to others who are walking a similar path.
